

THE NATIONAL BAND FESTIVAL was founded in 1900 by Mr. J. HENRY ILES

THE CRYSTAL PALACE BAND FESTIVAL.

ROM an entry of 40 bands in 1900, to-day's National Band Festival has increased to an entry this year of no less than 125 brass bands.

Bands are graded in Six Sections:-

- (1) CHAMPIONSHIP
- (2) GRAND SHIELD
- (3) JUNIOR CUP (A and B)
- (4) JUNIOR SHIELD (A and B)

The names of the bands, their conductors, together with the names of the adjudicators and the music to be played, will be found elsewhere in this programme.

Up to 1912 (for the Championship) the music set for the bands to play was an "arrangement" of some work which was not originally composed for a brass band. Since 1913, and at the 1920, 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924, and 1925 contests, a work specially written for the brass band was the test piece. (There was no contest in the years 1914 to 1919.)

Since 1920, that is, at the last five contests for the Championship, more than 40 bands have competed in the Championship Section, the list covering every English brass band of note.

Previous to 1922 the bands played standing, with the conductor in the centre. That year (in the championship section) what is now known as "concert formation" was introduced—each player seated and using a separate music stand, the conductor in front of the band instead of the centre. At the 1923 contest, concert formation was adopted in each of the six sections.

At the 1922 contest the military band section was discarded in favour of an additional section for brass bands. This was the first of the "all brass" contests on a big scale. Previously there had been contests for military bands, boys bands, reed bands and concertina bands. Handbell ringers and vocalists have appeared at the concert held in the evening after the competitions and the evening concert items are now confined solely to brass bands.

As will be seen from the names of the bands entered for to-day's competitions, they come from many parts of England, Scotland and Wales.

In 1924 an Australian band competed for the Championship, which, up to the present, has always been retained by English bands. Another Australian Commonwealth Band is competing in present festival.

This annual event for the Brass Band Championship now creates immense interest in musical circles all over the kingdom, for it is at the Crystal Palace that the playing of brass instruments is heard at its best.

No one will deny that the Crystal Palace Annual Band Contests, which were initiated in 1900, as the National Brass Band Festival, by Mr. J. Henry Iles, the present director, have been the means of raising the standard of amateur band performances all over the United Kingdom.

It was in July, 1900, that Mr. Iles founded the Annual National Band Festival at the Crystal Palace for bands of the British Isles and the Colonies, comprising band contests and a concert by massed bands. He was instrumental in enlisting the keen personal support of the late Sir Arthur Sullivan, who first conducted the massed bands. To-day will be the 21st Festival, which has from the commencement been under the personal direction of Mr. Iles.

In 1905-6 Mr. Iles conceived the idea of cementing the entente cordiale by organising a tour in France with the Besses o' th' Barn Band in aid of municipal funds for the poor children's holidays. His late Majesty King Edward gave the scheme his patronage, and the band was invited to Windsor and gave a Royal Command Performance on the birthday of H R.H. The Prince of Wales. The tour was a magnificent success, Paris and the principal French towns being visited, their performance in Paris being attended by the President, and it was estimated over 100,000 persons. In recognition of his services, Mr. Iles had the distinguished honour conferred on him of the Officier d'Academie Francaise.

London, the provinces and France having been visited, Mr. Iles next determined to have demonstrated to the Colonial bandsmen and public the capabilities of amateur brass bands for the emulation of Colonial bands. This huge undertaking involved grave financial risks, for which Mr. Iles again voluntarily became personally responsible. Arrangemeent were made with the Besses o' th' Barn Band, the tour en route including America and Fiji.

In order that the bandsmen and the public in provincial districts should have the opportunity of hearing such prize bands of the North as Besses o' th' Barn, Black Dyke Mills, Wingates Temperance and St. Hilda Colliery, Mr. Iles arranged concert tours on their behalf, and undertook personally the financial responsibility for them. The result is that to-day a brass band performance is a recognised desideration in catering for seaside and public park audiences, and brass bands now have their share of engagements for other events with military bands and orchestras.

The value of brass band performances as a force in the musical education of the masses is at last fully admitted by the musical Press, critics and musicians generally, and the test pieces for the Championship Section at the contests have been for some years past especially composed for the event by well-known British composers.

 Since 1921 His Majesty The King has graciously given his patronage to this great Musical Festival, the largest of its kind in the world.

With their usual enterprise, the National Sunday League have arranged for the Band winning the Championship and Thousand Guinea Trophy to play on Sunday, September 26th, 1926, at the Finsbury Park Empire.



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
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THE HANDEL FESTIVAL, 1926

The Great Triennial Handel Festival

THE Handel Festivals stand pre-eminent in the world's musical history, and the 1926 Festival, held on June 5th, 8th, 10th and 12th, not only maintained, but increased the traditional glory of this great triennial event.

The performers numbered 3,500, comprising a chorus of 3,000 voices and an orchestra of 500 instrumentalists. The chorus was recruited largely from the Choral Societies and Choirs of London and the Home Counties Districts, but there were very substantial contingents from Sir Henry Coward's Yorkshire Choirs in Leeds, Huddersfield, Hull, Sheffield, Derby, etc., specially trained by him. There were also contingents of selected trained voices from Cardiff and other Welsh districts and from Norwich. The London Symphony Orchestra, consisting of 94 players, led the Orchestra as "Solo Band." Many other professional instrumentalists were included in the "Chorus Band," but the bulk of this consisted of amateur players, selected from the best of the amateur orchestras in London and the provinces.

For the first time the Festival was conducted by Sir Henry J. Wood, whose energy and skill were strikingly demonstrated throughout the rehearsals and the performances. "Messiah" and "Israel" were entirely re-scored by him, and those who heard the performances of these oratorios will not readily forget the marvellous effects produced. There were twelve rehearsals of the Choir and Orchestra, each of which was personally conducted by Sir Henry, and the excellent attendances at these, in spite of the difficulties occasioned by the General Strike, were a tribute to the goodwill and enthusiasm of the members of the Chorus and Orchestra.

The inclusion, on the first Festival Day, of five Choruses from Handel's Operas, formed an unprecedented but an entirely successful event. These Choruses were selected by Sir Henry after very long and careful research at the British Museum. They were rescored and arranged, new words written for them, and their tunefulness and general charm

were a source of delight to the large audience present. Another notable feature of the first day's programme was a rendering of No. 10 Organ Concerto, by the celebrated French Organist, Monsieur Marcel Dupré.

"Israel in Egypt" formed the principal item of the programme for the second day, and the enthusiasm with which it was received was far more marked than usual. Some

of its choruses were overwhelming in their majesty and tone.

The ever-popular "Messiah" was the concluding work performed on the third day, and it was thoroughly appreciated by the vast audience present. Light and shade were most effectively marked, the volume attained in the louder passages conveying the thrill peculiar to productions on this gigantic scale, whilst the tone and atmosphere maintained through the solo airs and softer choruses approached perfection.

Many of the well known artistes who had sung at previous Handel Festivals again took part, including Carrie Tubb, Florence Austral, Margaret Balfour, Ben Davies, Norman Allin and Robert Radford. Those singing for the first time were Flora Woodman, Muriel Brunskill, Edith Furmedge, Joseph Hislop, Walter Widdop and Horace Stevens. Walter W. Hedgcock was organist to the Festival and the work of general Musical Directorship once more devolved on him.

For the first time in the history of the Festival, gramophone records were made of the Choruses of the "Messiah" as they were sung. Some of these have already been published, and have proved highly successful, as they give an excellent idea of the majesty, tone and general effect of the great chorus and band.

The Festival was notable for the smoothness with which the whole organisation, under the General Manager, Mr. Henry James Buckland, with its great body of executants and its enormous audiences, was conducted, and it has added another page to the history of great and successful events held at the Crystal Palace.

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
